### THEME: RURAL HEALTH

Rural health refers to health and the healthcare challenges faced by those living in rural areas which differs from urban areas and its healthcare system due to geography, accessibility, and availability of healthcare resources.





### THEME: RURAL HEALTH

### Numerous factors contribute to the difficulties in well maintained rural health. These include -

- 1. Limited and reduced access to healthcare and facilities
  - Rural areas have on average fewer healthcare services and facilities.
  - Long travel times to better health services.
  - Few specialists and special equipment.

#### 2. Disparities in healthcare -

 Fewer access to healthcare and its services despite having higher incidences of co-morbidities, heart diseases and other chronic conditions.

#### 3. Socioeconomic factors-

- Economic challenges leading to poor infrastructure and facilities.
- Limited access to clean food and adequate nutrition leading to cases of malnutrition.
- Limited education also contributes to improper disease prevention and treatment.

#### 4. Workforce shortage

Shortage of healthcare facilities and workers.

#### 5. Emergency services

 Lack of emergency services and emergency care leads to failure of immediate treatment and poor cure rates.




#### SUB-THEMES

#### The Region of the Americas (AMRO)

- Region faces complex, multifaceted health and humanitarian challenges and is extremely vulnerable to natural hazards, including hurricanes, floods, and droughts.
- Challenges to health facilities, infrastructure damage, contamination of water supplies, disruption of health services, leading to increased vulnerability to diseases and health emergencies.

Main theme - Racial minority healthcare

**Sub theme** - One health campaign along with emphasis on drug use and healthcare infrastructure







#### SUB-THEMES

#### The African Region (AFRO)

- <u>Limited Resources:</u> Rural healthcare facilities lack adequate equipment, supplies, and personnel, leading to suboptimal healthcare delivery.
- <u>Infectious Diseases</u>: Rural populations face a high burden of infectious diseases like HIV, malaria, and tuberculosis
- <u>Maternal and Child Health</u> along with cultural or educational barriers and socio-economic factors hinder adequate rural health.

Main theme - Universal health coverage and Primary Health care . . (Accessibility, Availability and Quality)

Sub theme - Indigenous medicine and rural health strategies







## SUB-THEMES <u>The Eastern Mediterranean Region (EMRO)</u>

- Chronic Diseases and Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs): Face high rates of chronic diseases – diabetes, CVS diseases, and respiratory illnesses.
- Mental Health: Mental health services are often overlooked in rural regions. Stigma around mental illness, coupled with a lack of mental health professionals, means many rural dwellers struggle with untreated psychological conditions.
- <u>Impact of Conflict:</u> Health systems weakened by infrastructure destruction, displacement, and the challenges of providing care in warzones.

Main theme - Wartime crisis- collapse of healthcare systems, including an aspect of mental health

**Sub theme** – Violence against healthcare workers and gender disparities







#### SUB-THEMES

#### The Southeast Asian Region (SEAR)

- <u>Limited Access to Healthcare Facilities</u>: Some countries have vast rural areas with limited transportation infrastructure.
- <u>Infectious Diseases</u>: Diseases such as malaria, tuberculosis, dengue, and diarrheal diseases, which are common in rural areas.
- <u>Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs)</u>:Rural Southeast Asia is also facing an increase in non-communicable diseases (NCDs) such as hypertension, diabetes, and cancer.

Main theme - HIV and STD management

**Sub theme** - Mental health access in rural health settings, along with healthcare worker shortage







#### SUB-THEMES

#### The European Region (EURO)

- Access to Healthcare Services: Rural residents rely on smaller local clinics, not offer comprehensive medical services, requiring travel to larger cities.
- <u>Aging Population</u>: The aging population in rural areas require more medical care and support due to chronic conditions, mobility issues, and age-related diseases.
- <u>Mental Health:</u> The stigma surrounding mental illness, combined with the lack of mental health professionals, rural people often do not receive the care and support they need.
- <u>Impact of Migration</u>: Rural areas in Europe also experience effects of internal and external migration, younger people moving to urban centers thus, leaving behind an aging population.

Main theme - Migrant health care challenges and burden maintenance

**Sub theme** - Digitization of healthcare systems causing urban rural .

#### SUB-THEMES

#### The Western Pacific Region (WPRO):

- <u>Geographic Isolation and Access to Healthcare</u>: Many rural areas in the Western Pacific, geographically isolated. These remote communities often have limited or no access to healthcare facilities and services.
- <u>Infectious Diseases and Public Health Threats</u>: Rural communities are more vulnerable to infectious diseases like malaria, tuberculosis, dengue fever, and other vector-borne diseases.
- <u>Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs)</u>: Diabetes, hypertension, and heart disease in rural populations have limited access to preventive care, screenings, and health education.
- Health Inequities and Socioeconomic Disparities, and cultural barriers add to poorer health outcomes due to historical factors, lack of culturally appropriate care, and systemic discrimination.

Main theme - Antimicrobial resistance in a rural community setting

Sub theme - Traditional medicinal practices, parasitic infestations

and mental health


